MINUTES REGULAR MEETING OF THE BUFFALO & ERIE COUNTY PUBLIC LIBRARY BOARD OF TRUSTEES January 16, 2020

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library (B&ECPL) was held on Thursday, January 16, 2020, at the Central Library pursuant to due notice to trustees. The following members were present:

Chair Kathleen Berens Bucki called the meeting to order at 4:04 p.m. in the Joseph B. Rounds Conference Room. A quorum was present.

Trustee Lucy Candelario joined the meeting via conference call; however, as this did not conform to the Bylaws of the B&ECPL Article II, Section 6, it therefore did not constitute presence at the meeting, thus she was not counted for quorum or voting.

Agenda Item B – Approval/Changes to the Agenda. There were no changes to the proposed agenda.

Agenda Item C – Minutes of the Meeting of December 19, 2019. On motion by Trustee El-Behairy, seconded by Trustee Burd, the Minutes were approved as mailed.

Trustee Moore arrived at 4:06 p.m.

Agenda Item D - Report of the Nominating Committee.

Agenda Item D.1 – Election of Officers and Executive Committee. Nominating Committee Chair Frank Housh reported the Committee met on January 8th. The following slate was nominated for 2020 (all nominees were willing to accept appointment):

Chair – Kathleen Berens Bucki Vice Chair – Kimberly Johnson Secretary – Alan Bedenko Treasurer – Joel Moore

In addition, it was proposed that Trustees Berlow, Burd and Panty serve on the Executive Committee. There were no nominations from the floor. Trustee Ted Johnson moved to approve the slate as presented. Trustee El-Behairy made a second. Approval was unanimous. Chair Bucki commented she looks forward to working with everyone.

Agenda Item E – Meeting Schedule for 2020. The 2020 meeting schedule was included in the board packet mailing.

Agenda Item F - Report of the Chair

Chair Bucki announced she is recommending Trustee Sharon Kelly as the B&ECPL's second representative for the Library Foundation of Buffalo and Erie County Board; Ms. Kelly had previously consented.

2020 *Committee Volunteer Forms* were included in the board packets and are due back to the Director's Office by February 1st.

Trustees were reminded completed *Conflict of Interest Statements* are due back to the Director's Office.

Contract Library System Liaison Assignments – Originally, the intention was to have assigned System liaisons attend one contract library board meeting each year. As this has not been happening, Chair Bucki suggested changing the liaison program and have every System trustee be a System liaison for 1 or 2 contract libraries. A letter will be sent to each contract library Board President with their System liaison's name and contact information. The contract library Board President will be encouraged to reach out to the liaison and invite them to one of their board meetings. Chair Bucki expressed she feels it would be nice if each System liaison made an effort to attend at least one meeting. A 2020 contract library System liaison sign-up sheet was passed around.

Agenda Item G - Committee Reports.

Agenda Item G.1 – Executive Committee. The Executive Committee met on January 9, 2020; a copy of the written report was at each trustee's place. Committee Chair Bedenko summarized the meeting and requested the written report be entered into the Minutes. Trustee Kimberly Johnson moved. Trustee El-Behairy made a second, and this was approved unanimously.

Present: Executive Committee Chair Kathleen Berens Bucki; Vice Chair Alan Bedenko; Committee members Sheldon Berlow and Katie Burd. Also present were Trustee Elaine Panty, Library Director Mary Jean Jakubowski, Chief Operating Officer (C.O.O.) Jeannine Doyle and Chief Financial Officer (C.F.O.) Ken Stone.

Chair Bucki called the meeting to order at 4:08 p.m. in the Joseph B. Rounds Conference Room at the Central Library. A quorum was present.

Chair Bucki shared an article published in the January 9, 2020 *AM-POL Eagle* written by her father-in-law Judge Carl L. Bucki entitled *Library exhibit puts focus on Buffalo's and Polonia's contributions to the Work War I effort.* The article describes the Central Library's *Buffalo Never Fails: The Queen City and World War I* exhibit focusing on portions of the exhibit dedicated to Buffalo's Polish community.

Chair Bucki conveyed the Nominating Committee of the Board met and will be bringing forth a slate of nominations for officers and the Executive Committee at the January 16th Board meeting.

The Committee reviewed the proposed agenda for the January 16th Board of Trustees meeting. C.F.O. Stone explained the proposed resolutions under the Budget and Finance Committee. C.O.O. Doyle discussed the Library Managers' benefits package including changes to health insurance contributions. Discussion ensued.

C.F.O. Stone then reported the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library continues to operate within budget.

Director Jakubowski provided an update on the sidewalks surrounding and traversing Buffalo's Reading Park (Reading Park). She sent a letter to the City and Buffalo Place, whereby discussions were had regarding the importance of the sidewalks to remain clear of ice and snow. Initial indication was that the City was to work with Buffalo Place to cordon off the small sidewalk that traverses the Reading Park during months of potential inclement weather.

Subsequently, it was determined by the City and Buffalo Place that Buffalo Place would commit to keeping that sidewalk clear of ice and snow. Director Jakubowski indicated she would stay abreast of the situation.

Welcome letters were sent to newly elected City of Buffalo Councilmembers and Erie County Legislators by Director Jakubowski requesting a meeting with each.

The Executive Committee meeting adjourned at 4:40 p.m. on a motion by Trustee Burd, with a second by Trustee Bedenko.

Agenda Item G.2 - Budget and Finance Committee.

Agenda Item G.2.a – Amend 2019 and 2020 Budgets – NYS Assembly Grants-in-Aid. Deputy Director - Chief Financial Officer (C.F.O.) Ken Stone explained Resolution 2020-1 as presented. Trustee Panty moved for approval. Trustee El-Behairy seconded and approval was unanimous.

RESOLUTION 2020-1

WHEREAS, on December 23, 2019, the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library (B&ECPL) received \$45,000 in special aid funds approved by the New York State Legislature for libraries located within Assembly Districts 143 and 149, and

WHEREAS, this special aid was sponsored by New York State Assemblymembers Monica P. Wallace (District 143) and Sean Ryan (District 149), and

WHEREAS, private and public grants are regularly sought to augment library equipment, materials, programs and other needs, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of the B&ECPL gratefully accepts the award of \$45,000 in State Aid, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the B&ECPL will encourage the receiving libraries to promptly utilize these funds for purposes consistent with the sponsor's designation, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of the B&ECPL approves the following amendments to the 2019 and 2020 Operating Budgets, increasing revenues and expenses as follows:

RESOLVED, that the Board of Trustees of the B&ECPL authorizes the B&ECPL and the above contracting member libraries to retain these funds until such time as they can be used for purposes consistent with any sponsor designation, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the above libraries are authorized to transfer these funds to other expense accounts within their budget based upon the final determined use, and be it finally

RESOLVED, that a copy of this Resolution and a revised Exhibit A be transmitted to the above cited contract libraries.

Agenda Item G.2.b – Amendments to Contract Library – Library Managers Benefits Package. C.F.O. Stone explained Resolution 2020-2 as presented. He pointed out the estimated combined total net cost for all 3 individuals affected is \$4,400. On motion by Trustee Kimberly Johnson, seconded by Trustee Bedenko, approval was unanimous.

RESOLUTION 2020-2

WHEREAS, there are three (3) contract libraries: Angola Public Library, Marilla Free Library, and the North Collins Public Library, of the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library (B&ECPL) System who have employees in the title of Library Manager whom are not represented by a bargaining unit, and

WHEREAS, the Library Managers are not eligible for cost of living adjustments without approval of the System Board of Trustees, and

WHEREAS, as the result of collective bargaining, a significant disparity exists in the pay scales and health insurance contributions for Library Managers and other

represented employees within the B&ECPL System holding the same job group (currently classified a Job Group 7), and

WHEREAS, the B&ECPL Director has reviewed the current wages and benefits of the Library Managers and has recommended modifications in recognition of the level of managerial responsibilities to their associated Boards of Trustees and communities, cost of living adjustments, and the current disparity among the Library Managers and represented B&ECPL employees, now therefore be it

RESOLVED, effective January 1, 2020, January 1, 2021, and January 1, 2022, respectively, those holding the Library Manager titles will be paid at the same hourly rate as the Job Group 7 as negotiated under the collective bargaining agreement of the Civil Service Employees Association, Inc. Local 100, for 2020, 2021 and 2022, and be it further

RESOLVED, effective the first pay period following approval of this resolution, Library Managers electing employer provided health insurance will be responsible for paying 15% of the Value Plan premium, and be it finally

RESOLVED, that the Library Director or her designee is authorized to implement budget transfers within the personnel accounts needed to budget for this change.

Agenda Item G.2.c - Monthly Financial Report. The monthly financial report for the year as of November 30, 2019 month-end close was included in the board packet as an information item. The Library continues to operate within budget.

Agenda Item H - Report of the Director. Director Mary Jean Jakubowski called on Meg Cheman and Amy Pickard who showed a sampling of books on-loan from *The Fred* Jordan Collection - Four Centuries of Bookbinding for which the B&ECPL has undertaken a major fundraising campaign to purchase. This Collection was offered to the Library for \$120,000 (assessed value is \$195,000). Representing about 400 years of binding history, the Collection will complement the Library's current fine binding and press collections. A catalog of the entire Collection was available for trustee viewing. Director Jakubowski remarked we are a little more than half way to the fundraising goal to purchase the Jordan Collection; letters seeking donations have been sent out and conversations have been held with local foundations. In response to Trustee Berlow's questions, Ms. Pickard explained it is extremely unusual for a public library to have a rare book collection of the caliber of the B&ECPL's. In the United States, outside of New York City and Boston, our rare books and unique collections are considered next in line in terms of caliber. Board members can help us to successfully raise the required funds by getting the word out about the B&ECPL's rare and unique collections. Tours for groups and individuals can be scheduled; this has been done in the past and has subsequently generated funding. Trustee Panty asked if there is a timeframe on the offer. Director Jakubowski remarked we have until the fall of 2020 to gather the rest of

the funds and feels confident we will be able to do so. In response to Trustee Gist's question, discussion took place about exploring future possible digitization of this collection if acquired.

The Director was pleased to announce the new, fully ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) accessible B&ECPL website was launched on Monday, January 13th. The Director called on Deputy Director – Chief Operating Officer (C.O.O.) Jeannine Doyle who did a demonstration of the *crisper*, *less cluttered*, *easier to use*, *and much improved* device-reactive website. She called attention to the following:

- The "Get a Library Card" page was completely revamped and, in the next few months, they hope to launch a completely online application;
- Each library has its own page under "Location + Hours" with added levels of uniformity, headers and footers that have the same format which carry through to every page, a listing of and clear delineation of System policies and each library's own policies along with their own board information including scheduled board meeting dates, agendas and minutes which are important to their Minimum Standards and Charter; and
- Pages linked to external sites, i.e. the catalog, audiobooks and eBooks, will look
 the same as on the former website as we do not have control over how they look.
 C.O.O. Doyle pointed out SirsiDynix, the Library's integrated library services
 (ILS) provider is undergoing updates to become a more responsive platform.
 This will improve the Library's online catalog.

The Director and Board members thanked everyone involved in the new website for all their hard work. Director Jakubowski mentioned we have had nothing but positive feedback since it launched.

The Director shared pictures with trustees of the Central Library' auditorium currently undergoing renovation.

The 2019 Year-end Appeal campaign has come to a close having brought in approximately \$80,000. The Director shared that from these funds, \$750 will be given to each library in the System as well as the bookmobile to be used for programming and/or furniture/equipment purchases with an option for each to ask to receive an additional \$250. This is a total increase of \$250 each from last year. In response to Trustee Panty's question if the public is aware of what the donations have been used for, Director Jakubowski conveyed we ask that libraries let people know the programs, furniture and/or equipment purchased are from monies received from the Appeal.

B&ECPL Monthly Report December 2019

2019

Throughout 2019, the Buffalo & Erie County Public Library (B&ECPL) worked hard to provide services and resources to meet the ever-changing needs of our communities. As centers of activity, in 2019 in-house group program attendance increased by 12% with over 230,000 attending 16,690 programs. As part of our adult technology training, one-on-one training sessions increased by 25% demonstrating the need to continue to offer individualized, topic-specific, educational opportunities. While use of public access computers decreased by 8.8%, Wi-Fi usage grew by 5.7%. The B&ECPL website was visited more than 9 million times (website, online catalog and digital collections). Subject Guides continue to be accessed locally, nationally and internationally.

With over 380,000 library cardholders, B&ECPL staff examined collections and collection usage, adjusting budget lines to address the increased demand for electronic resources – eBooks, downloadable audio books and downloadable music. Electronic collections rose by 26%. eBook circulation increased by 23.1% and downloadable audio book use by 44.1%. Streaming music services, including downloadable music and music videos, rose by 34%. In 2019, eBooks, downloadable audio books, downloadable music/music videos and downloadable streaming videos equated to just over 19.6% of B&ECPL's total circulation of 6,635,641. Overall circulation rose by 1.8% between 2018 and 2019 – a tremendous feat, given many libraries throughout both New York and the Country are showing a slow, albeit steady, decline in this area. Interlibrary Loan (ILL) Department usage rose by 40.8%.

Our libraries remained busy with nearly 2.1 million visits. Social network followers expanded to more than 24,000, over 3.8 million items were shipped between B&ECPL libraries, and the *Library on Wheels* bookmobile traversed Erie County's 1,058 square miles bringing library services to underserved areas, participating in special events, parades and festivals. Beyond the *Library on Wheels*, staff brought library services into schools, day care centers, senior centers, Canalside, Kleinhans Music Hall, the Buffalo Niagara Convention Center, and so on. The *Library on Wheels* also assisted B&ECPL's libraries undergoing construction/renovation, providing service at the Dudley Branch Library, Elma Public Library and Grand Island Memorial Library.

Libraries throughout the System jumped into action and opened additional hours on 2 occasions to assist with Erie County's *Beat the Heat Program*, whereby residents were encouraged to seek refuge and "cool off" at their local library on days designated by the Erie County Health Department as having dangerously high temperatures and a high heat index.

August welcomed the official opening of Buffalo's Reading Park (Reading Park). Located adjacent to the downtown Central Library, more than 300 people attended the grand opening event participating in a plethora of free outdoor activities. Erie County Executive Mark C. Poloncarz joined this writer and representatives from B&ECPL's partners in an official ribbon cutting ceremony. The Reading Park has been well used, with programs ranging from a Reading Invasion to NASA @ your Library, from Storytime to STEM, and beyond. Response from the public has been positive, finding it a welcoming place to enjoy lunch, take a break and/or attend a program. Many have even been seen reading! Funded through a generous Heart of the Community grant from Southwest Airlines, the Reading Park was developed in cooperation with the City of Buffalo and County of Erie. Many of B&ECPL's partners also contributed: Just Buffalo Literary Center, Buffalo Place, Literacy New York Buffalo-Niagara, Inc., Young Audiences of Western New York, Restoration Society, Inc., Buffalo Presidential Center and the Hispanic Heritage Council of WNY, Inc.

In 2019, B&ECPL received modest increases in both State and local funding. We are grateful for our funders and will work to use the funds both effectively and efficiently. We also worked hard to fundraise, receiving more than \$420,000 through generous contributions from Library supporters, commercial sponsors, bequests and grants. Funds raised were used for children and adult programming, for special events, to purchase books and other materials, and to replace outdated/worn and damaged equipment and furnishings throughout the Library System.

We look forward to providing continued excellent, quality library services in 2020. All B&ECPL libraries will be involved in the 2020 Decennial Census – encouraging the residents of Erie County to Get Counted at the Library using our free public access computers and high-speed Internet access. As demand continues, programs, programs and more programs for children, teens and adults, in both group and individual settings, will be a main focus. Outreach is expected to grow through both the Library on Wheels and our involvement with community partners including but not limited to schools, senior centers, community centers, festivals, parades and so on. Resources, both print and electronic, will be added to our collections. Our rare book exhibit *Buffalo* Never Fails: The Queen City and World War I will come to a conclusion in early 2020 and a new exhibit, B is for Book, will be launched thereafter. I encourage everyone to check out our new website expected to launch in early 2020 and to become a Library supporter. The B&ECPL is committed to Erie County's diverse communities and beyond – providing excellent customer service, exploring new, exciting programming, listening to our constituents, expanding technology, simplifying access to good quality

information and meeting the needs of those we serve. The community will be encouraged to help set the course for B&ECPL's future by participating in the development of B&ECPL's 2022-2026 5-Year Plan of Service, due to New York State in 2021.

We look forward to seeing everyone in the Reading Park and at the Library!

Genealogy Collection

The Grosvenor Room received additions to a unique and significant collection of records from the Erie County Medical Corporation (ECMC) including 6 ledgers from the Erie County Poor House that date back to the opening of the institution in 1829, and include records of intake and deaths in the Erie County Hospital up to 1925. In addition, the ledgers contain a unique window into life in the Poor House including

recorded outbreaks of cholera, typhoid fever and measles. The Grosvenor Room now has 15 volumes of Poor House records spanning the years 1829 to 1952. Grosvenor Room Librarian **Sue Cutrona** is working on an inventory of volumes.

Subject Guides

Subject Guides were viewed by 945 visitors from 13 countries in December. In addition to the United States, visitor countries of origin included Bangladesh, Canada, Colombia, France, Germany, India, Ireland, Israel, Japan, Moldova, the Philippines, and Vietnam.

3. Technology

Integrated Library Server (ILS) - Server Migration

Working with B&ECPL Information Technology staff, engineers from SirsiDynix coordinated the migration of critical patron, circulation, and holdings data from old to new servers with increased storage capacity. As a result of the migration, essential reports and other processes will be run more efficiently in the SirsiDynix Symphony ILS.

Launch Pad Equipment

The Launch Pad received a set of 5 new Oculus Quest virtual reality headsets that will be used in group trainings and creative programming.



4. Funding/Fundraising

Funding:

Erie County 2020 Budget

On December 5th, the Erie County Legislature adopted a 2020 County Budget with amendments. The Legislature supported the Library's allocation; while they approved amendments in other parts of the County Budget, none changed the County Executive's 2020 Budget allocation for the Library.

The Library's overall operating budget, including State Aid and library revenue, increases 2.6% from 2019's \$28,485,469 to \$29,230,087 in 2020. Including grants, the combined total also increases 2.6% from 2019's \$29,176,921 to \$29,921,887 in 2020.

The 2020 Operating and Grants Budget sustains current library operations and services. Further, it incorporates the impacts of contractually obligated costs related to current labor agreements and those approved for unrepresented and managerial/confidential employees via previous Board resolutions.

The County's Capital Budget provides \$500,000 to support improvements to the county-owned downtown Central Library; specifically, \$250,000 to address building exterior envelope and site rehabilitation and related needs and \$250,000 for continued rehabilitation of the 50+ year old building's mechanical, electrical and plumbing systems.

City of Buffalo 2020 Capital Budget and 2021-2024 Capital Improvement Program
The Buffalo Common Council adopted its 2020 Capital Budget and approved a 20212024 Buffalo Capital Improvement Program on December 10, 2019 which included
several Buffalo Branch Library projects. The 2020 budget authorizes (2020) bonding of
\$535,000 approved for Crane Branch Library ADA improvement and general
renovations (Phase 2) and authorizes budgeting for bonding in a future year including:
\$800,000 to support the Isaías González-Soto Branch Library rehabilitation, \$450,000 for
the Frank E. Merriweather, Jr. Branch Library rehabilitation, and \$250,000 to complete
rehabilitation of the Leroy R. Coles, Jr. Branch Library.

Phase 1 of the Crane Branch Library project which focuses on adding an elevator and ADA compliant restrooms is expected to begin in spring, 2020. Funds for Crane Branch Library Phase 2 will help match a \$916,536 New York State Aid for Library Construction program application to complete renovation of the Crane Branch Library. The Phase 2 project includes renovating and rehabilitating interior library space and providing access to the 2nd floor roof space for public use.

9. Planning for the Future

B&ECPL e-Branch

Following an extensive review of services offered and consistent declining usage statistics, the B&ECPL's e-Branch will be disbanded in the formal sense effective January 6, 2020. Services including both telephone directory and e-mail reference question services will be distributed amongst the Central Library Borrower Services and Information Services Departments. Questions received by the 858-8900 telephone line will be redirected. Little to no disruption is expected to patrons. Staff from e-Branch will be redeployed to the Buffalo Branches, Interlibrary Loan Department and Borrower Services. Samantha Purpora and Information Services and Outreach Manager Daniel Caufield are coordinating the project.

Rare Book Room Seeking Donations

As a part of a fundraising campaign, Special Collections Department Manager **Meg Cheman** and Rare Book Room Curator **Amy Pickard** presented samples from the *Jordan Collection*, a stellar collection of titles chronicling 400 years of bookbinding history, to the Library Foundation of Buffalo and Erie County. If acquired, this collection which includes over 100 titles will complement B&ECPL's fine press and bindings collection, as well as our collection of illuminated manuscripts and 17th – 20th century literature. The collection offered to the B&ECPL for \$120,000 has been valued at \$195,000. The Library Foundation has committed up to \$40,000 in matching funds towards the purchase of the collection. Fundraising efforts continue.

Fighting the Opiate Epidemic

Information Services and Outreach Librarian **Renée Masters** continues to coordinate Central Library's bimonthly session of the Erie County Opiate Epidemic Task Force's *Free Community Opioid Overdose Recognition and Naloxone Reversal Training Class*. The

Central Library has been making this training available since January of 2017, providing community access to this life-saving skill and important information about opioid use in Erie County.
